## Pastor's Message

May 6th marked my one year anniversary as pastor of United Evangelical Church. As mile markers such as my first day, or my first Sunday, have come up, I find myself reminiscing about what I was experiencing during that time. I can see in myself ways that I have changed, ways I feel that God has remolded me like a potter remolds clay into the vessel that is needed for the task.

I have always found the imagery of God as a Potter to be very meaningful. It reminds me that God is a living God, one who is constantly involved, always present. God's hands are always in on the making of our lives even if at the time we don't recognize God's presence. This imagery also reminds me that God is always creating anew, God is always molding. Our job then, as clay, is to remain soft, malleable, in order to be formed to the vessel that the Potter has need of. This job at times isn't as easy as it sounds.

This imagery of clay in the Potter's hands translates not only to us as individuals, but also to us as the institution of the church. God is always in need of re-making the church for the ways it is to be used. Reflecting briefly on United's history, we served once as a haven for German speaking immigrants, it was God's need of us at that time. At one point we served as the social gathering place for youth in the neighborhood. More recently, we help to support the educational needs of preschoolers through the PACT program.

*God's hands are always in on the making of our lives...*


During this last year, myself and council have spent time discerning how it is God is molding us for the place in history we occupy. We believe that including a contemporary worship service as a part of the vessel we

are, is how God is forming us. I am reading a book entitled, *So You're Thinking About Contemporary Worship* by Tim and Kathy Carson. In it they describe worship as a ship that carries a precious cargo, and that through time this vessel has needed to be adapted to sail to new and formerly unanticipated ports. In describing contemporary worship they say:

[It is]...taking the legacy of our best theology and worship to a new port of call. This is a port our ancestors could never have imagined. It is the port of our contemporary world. This port is both like and unlike ports of the past. Its distinctiveness requires a way of worship that, like a scribe of the kingdom, must bring forth the best of the old and the new. And unless the church is willing to sail in a vehicle capable of traveling in such waters, the bread and wine that we stow in our hold will never find their way to those languishing in the spiritual famine of our times. (p.2, Chalice Press, 1997)

I think that we all would agree that we are surrounded by a world that is "languishing in a spiritual famine." As we step into the next year together, I pray that we will all be open to the molding that God will do in our midst to make us the vessel the Potter has need of.

We have just completed another successful and inspirational Lenten and Easter season. As we move into summer there are several key events being planned that will positively impact on the future of our church congregation.


I will mention these upcoming events, however, they will be expanded upon in other articles in this newsletter.

## Comments from Your Church Council

### Christian Education Committee

---

At our last meeting on May 21st, our attention was mostly focused on upcoming events. We will be sponsoring a Christian Education seminar on August 16th and we will be coordinating the games at our congregational picnic on September 14th.

While we look towards seeing our attendance in church school increase, our current enrollment is not very large and attendance on most Sundays is small. To better meet the needs of our children and provide them with a program that will be more inclusive, we are keeping our current curriculum, Seasons of the Spirit, but will be beginning a Multiage Program that will bring children of various ages together once they have reached elementary school age. The program will still be based on the church lectionary as it has been the last couple of years. This format will enable our children to have some worship time together as a combined group, interaction between the younger children and the older ones, and age appropriate activities suited for all the children. With this new design, we are hoping to find interested individuals from our church willing to teach about once every six weeks. More about this will follow in the next article.

The correlation between the church school materials and church worship makes a very good "fit" when the children are part of the church service each week for the children's sermon.

Plans for games and recreational activities during the congregational picnic on September 14th are progressing nicely. We think that everyone will have a good time, whether you want to take part in active games or prefer something less strenuous. Since this park has such nice nature trails and is historic as well, we hope to have someone associated with recreation and parks do a nature/history walk in the afternoon.

Bring your children to church school, the building with the red doors. We think they will enjoy the experience and the fellowship of other children!

### Teaching in the Church School A Little Time - A Big Reward !






