
This church has a proud tradition surrounding confirmation, and I know that to hear that there will


PICNIC

which reads in part: "Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has

freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations." On June 1, 1954, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day to honor all U.S. veterans.

On Veterans Day this year, let us remember and honor those men and women who gave of themselves, and let us continue to pray for our men and women currently serving in the military.



Christian Fiction Review



The Begotten

By: Lisa T. Bergren

Imagine for a moment that there were superheroes in the 14th century A.D. Now imagine that their "powers" were actually the more spectacular of the spiritual gifts listed by the Apostle Paul in Corinthians (healing, miracles, etc.). Imagine further that the rise of this select group of Gifted people was prophesied by Paul in the missing third letter to the Corinthian church, a letter that was not included in the Canon, but has been preserved nevertheless.

Lisa T. Bergren apparently went through a similar imagination session and came up with the ideas for this new trilogy, beginning with *The Begotten*.

Needless to say, the consternation when a woman begins actually healing people in 1339, in the midst of the Inquisition, is substantial. Lady Daria d'Angelo, fortunately, is assisted by a priest with the gift of Wisdom, and a knight with Faith greater than any. Unfortunately, the forces aligned against them are legion - not only do they face controversy within the Church itself, but a mysterious person calling himself the Sorcerer is about, seeking to twist the Gifted into his own image.

If this were a superhero story, this would be the beginning chapters, when the team is assembled. Unfortunately, it takes a long time for that to happen beyond the initial three. There are constant discussions about who the other Gifted WILL be, but waiting for one or more of them to show up occupies much of the book. The tale is truly fascinating, but a bit slow in parts.

A lot of the slowness involves the politics and commerce of the city of Siena and surrounding areas in Italy. While important to the character of Lady Daria and her background, it's still somewhat confusing at times and requires careful reading. At the same time, that detail adds to the realism of the story, so it's a plus and a minus.

I've seen this book compared to *The DaVinci Code*, but the only real similarity is an ancient document. I've also seen it compared to *The Lord of the Rings*. That comparison might be more apt, perhaps, but there is much left to see, if so. The remaining two books of the trilogy will determine the validity of that.

Overall, it's a fascinating tale, with great, great potential. I'm truly looking forward to seeing where Lisa Bergren goes with this. Recommended.

The Goodwill Man

In the early years of the 20th century, a pastor in Boston had a burning passion to help the poor, those who were handicapped, and immigrants who found it difficult to adjust to American practices. With steadfast prayer and God's hand guiding him along, the Rev. Edgar James Helms started Goodwill Industries.

Today it is a widespread movement dedicated "to help the helpless to help themselves." It continues to help the handicapped, the jobless and the poor.

Before he died in 1943, Helms wrote the following statement:

"I, Edgar James Helms, have often been referred to as the founder of Goodwill Industries. This is not strictly true. The originator of Goodwill Industries was the Master of men, who spoke from a Galilean hillside 1900 years ago and commanded his disciples to 'gather up the fragments that nothing be lost.'

"We, his disciples, are commanded to 'Go thou and do likewise.' We receive our marching orders from him, who commanded us to 'seek and save the lost.' He expects us to literally, 'Feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit those who are sick and in prison.'"

Down through the years, Goodwill has existed for service, not financial profits — all because of the Man from Galilee and Edgar Helms, his servant.

Pastor Appreciation Month

Many churches observe October as Pastor Appreciation Month. Given the reluctance of many pastors to call attention to themselves, it's not likely that they will mention anything about being appreciated.

Were someone to ask a pastor, however, what might be done to show appreciation to him or her, the answer would likely be, "Pray for me."

St. Paul never asked for anything for himself except that others pray for him. To the church at Rome, he wrote, "I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by our Lord Jesus Christ and by the love of the Spirit, to join me in earnest prayer to God on my behalf, that I may be rescued from the unbelievers in Judea, and that my ministry to Jerusalem may be acceptable to the saints, so that by God's will I may come to you with joy and be refreshed in your company" (Romans 15:30-32, NRSV).

Encourage your pastor by assuring him or her of your prayers and love.



More Points to Ponder

What Do Prayers of Thanksgiving Include?

Prayers of thanksgiving are proclaimed throughout the Bible. In 1 Chronicles 16:7-36, we are shown through David's song an excellent example of four elements included in true thanksgiving:

- ◆ *Remembering* what God has done for us.
- ◆ *Telling* others about it.
- ◆ *Showing* God's glory to others.
- ◆ *Offering* gifts of ourselves, our time, and our resources.

Of the 150 psalms, David wrote 73 of them. This collection of prayers and songs express the heartfelt feelings from deep within his soul. In them, we



can read prayers of thanks for answered prayer, deliverance from difficulties, God's greatness, His protection, His enduring mercy, and never ending love. God provides all of those things for us still today.

Prayers of giving thanks are indeed important as we all have reasons to be thankful. In fact, we are reminded "Keep on praying. No matter what happens, always be thankful, for this is God's will. . ." (1 Thesalonians 5:18). We can be thankful for who God is and for the opportunity He gives us to turn to Him in all situations, good and bad. God is always there for us. Our sincere prayers let Him know that we are thankful for that. Prayers of thanksgiving should be a continuous part of our everyday lives.

Psalms 100 is a vow of thanksgiving. It says, "Shout with joy to the LORD, O earth! Worship the LORD with gladness. Come before Him, singing with joy. Acknowledge that the LORD is good! He made us, and we are His. We are His people, the sheep of His pasture. Enter His gates with thanksgiving; go into His courts with praise. Give thanks to Him and bless His name. For the LORD is good. His unfailing love continues forever, and His faithfulness continues to each generation."

The following song contains words stating what we should be most thankful for. Jesus came to pay the debt for sins of which we are all guilty; He was sacrificed and resurrected, paving the way for our forgiveness:








Pastor's Business Card
