Pastor's Message

The Other Side of the Equation

Over the past several months, the church council has been faced with one difficult decision after another. Part of the difficulty is that there is no precedent for many of the decisions the council must make. For the past 70 years this church has had its rhythm of operation. Every spring and fall there were dinners. The Sunday School Building was needed for the Sunday School. On Sundays we prepared for hundreds of people to be at worship. The council's tasks were clear – maintain the rhythm.

Things are not as clear as they once were. We all know that these rhythms have slowly faded. Over the 4 years that I have been pastor, we have tried some new things hoping to find a new rhythm. We have resurrected the church picnic, we have used new educational paradigms in the Sunday School, we began a Saturday contemporary service, we have a fellowship hour between services. While all of these have had positive impacts on our lives together, maintaining some of these rhythms has also proven to be beyond the resources of the church.

This lack of resources has prompted the music committee to recommend that we stop our 1st Saturday Contemporary Worship Service. (Please read the music committee article in this newsletter) Many, many good things have come out of this service, just ask anyone who was involved, or who regularly attended. It is important that we build upon the learnings and positive things which we are taking away from this service. It is also important that we build upon the learnings and positive things we have experienced from the other happenings we no longer do as a church.

One way to build upon these learnings is to enter into what is called a "visioning study." I have heard more than once from council that we need a "business plan," a strategic approach for the future direction of the church. A visioning study is a business plan designed for the business of the church. It is something we enter into not by looking at numbers and finances as a business would, but as the church we enter into it through prayer and discernment. The goal is that we will build a vision from which council can take direction.

Pastor's Message—(cont'd)

Many of the things we have undertaken over these recent years have come from asking questions such as "what should we do?" and "how should we do it?" Any good business knows that there are questions that must be answered first, the questions of "who are we?" and "what are we going to be?" A visioning study is designed for us to ask these deeper questions of ourselves; to ask "What is God calling us to be?"

It has been obvious for some time that too much of the council's time and energy was being spent on "maintenance" items, trying to maintain rhythms that have faded; leaving too little energy to go toward growth. As the church, maintaining tradition is only one side of the equation, we need the other side of the equation – we must envision the future as we celebrate the past.


This work of envisioning can not be done by the council alone, but necessarily needs to include the entire church. Over the summer you may be asked to take part in the visioning study, my prayer is that everyone will be committed to the success of the church. We will be kicking off the visioning study in concert with the church's anniversary. Set Sunday, September 24th aside as the day we will celebrate our past as we envision our future. Until then, may we all be devoted to praying that the vision of the Lord for his church become our vision.

to be traveling many miles from here to Zambia to help people and share the word of the Lord. We have the Sunday School, the PACT group, the ladies organization and the Choir.



BOO

Normally, this is not the kind of book I would pick up at the store. As you might be able to tell from the collection of reviews on this site, I'm not a big fan of romance. Fortunately, this story is far more than that. It's an absolutely delightful romantic comedy... about a horror writer. For a change of pace from my usual diet of suspense, speculative fiction, and adventure tales, it was surprisingly enjoyable.

Wolfe Boone - "Boo" to the locals - is the world's best-selling writer of horror novels, and the biggest claim to fame the small town of Skary, Indiana, has ever had. While he's been churning out ghost-and-gore stories, his hometown has been transformed into a major tourist attraction, with everything centered around the horror theme (the Haunted Mansion restaurant, Sbooky's Bookstore, etc.). And what's up with all the cats?

So what happens when Wolfe suddenly becomes a Christian, gives up writing horror, and begins romantically pursuing Ainsley Parker, the one person in town who hates what he's done to it?

The rest of the town isn't very happy, to put it mildly. I'm reminded of the people who made Jesus leave the area after he cast the legion out of the demoniac into the pigs. A group of Skary's finest busybodies and hypocrites sets out to get Wolfe to forget his newfound faith (and love) and get back to the business of scaring people.


The result is a hilarious storyline that reads like a good old-fashioned Frank Capra film. Rene Gutteridge has filled the town of Skary with the wackiest and lovable ensemble cast I've read about in a long, long time. She also has more nerve than I do in coming up with names. A literary agent named Alfred Tension? I couldn't do that...

There's somewhat of a cliché in the conclusion, but isn't that always the case in stories like this? You know it's coming, but it's how the story gets there and what happens to the characters along the way that matters.

I have a feeling I'll be re-reading *Boo* a few times in the next few years. Light and entertaining, yet filled with faith and warmth, this is a book that will be well-used in my home. Highly Recommended.

Refiner's Fire

Malachi 3:3 says: "He will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver."

This verse puzzled some women in a Bible study and they wondered what this statement meant about the character and nature of God.

One of the women offered to find out the process of refining silver and get back to the group at their next Bible Study. That week, the woman called a silversmith and made an appointment to watch him at work. She didn't mention anything about the reason for her interest beyond her curiosity about the process of refining silver. As she watched the silversmith, he held a piece of silver over the fire and let it heat up. He explained that in refining silver, one needed to hold the silver in the middle of the fire where the flames were hottest as to burn away all the impurities. The woman thought about God holding us in such a hot spot; then she thought again about the verse that says: "He sits as a refiner and purifier of silver." 

