The "Evergreen" pins have come and I am sure that the girls who received them took back all the mean things they had said about the makers concerning the lateness for they can now show a pin worthy of the name "Evergreen". Henry Brendle was then thanked by our President for helping Miss Bertha mimeograph the songs. The club owes a great deal to Mr. Brendle for the help he has given in the past and we feel sure that with such good friends like him to back us and cooperate with us our club is sure to succeed.
