

AUDIENCE 'STUMPS' 2 FORUM SPEAKERS

Italian Former Diplomat
Fails To Answer Some
Of Questions

Official Of Foundation For
International Peace Also
Is Target

As the Italo-Ethiopian dispute was discussed yesterday at the final Open Forum of the season in Lehmann Hall, two of three speakers were exposed to a barrage of questions. The third was spared.

The principal target of the questioners was Signor Daniel Vare, a former Italian diplomat, who was presenting the Italian side of the issue. Some of the queries put to him he dismissed with a wave of his hand.

Second Speaker Quizzed

George A. Finch, assistant director of the Carnegie Foundation for International Peace, was not allowed to go unscathed. His suggestion, that European nations follow the United States' procedure of settling disputes through discourse to the courts, evoked questions which, he admitted, struck vulnerable spots in his armor.

After tracing the history of Ethiopia, Dr. W. B. Stern, a German now on a fellowship at the Johns Hopkins University, concluded with the statement that Italy, by its African invasion, had violated provisions of each of four pacts. His argument apparently was accepted by the audience without question.

Dr. F. C. Lane, of the history department, Johns Hopkins University, acted as chairman of the meeting.

Cites "Original Mistake"

The entire Ethiopian dispute, Signor Vare asserted, resulted from the "original mistake" of permitting the African nation to become a member of the League of Nations. He criticized the League for being "weak" and for its failure as an instrument to bring about the end of war.

When the question period was opened a listener asked Signor Vare why, since Italy joined with the Allies to fight German aggression, it would not be equitable for all of the other nations to unite in checking Italy's invasion of Ethiopia?

Another asked him "what kind of civilization" Italy could give Ethiopia when Mussolini takes children 5 years old to train them to be soldiers," while a third question concerned the "muzzling" of the press in Italy. The speaker also was asked the direct question why had Italy broken its pledges to the League and to Ethiopia?
