

# Rev. Lehmann Retiring

The Rev. Titus Lehmann has retired as pastor of the First United Evangelical Church of the United Church of Christ.

He will remain in the service of the church, however, until a successor has been named.

The Rev. Mr. Lehmann re-

ceived an honorary degree at the commencement exercises at Steed College of Technology at Johnson City, Tenn., last month.

### Early Years In Ohio

The Doctor of Divinity degree was awarded for "long, distinguished, and dedicated career as

a minister in the service of the United Evangelical Church."

The Rev. Mr. Lehmann was born January 19, 1890, and spent his early years in Cleveland, Ohio, until the death of his father.

His brother, Timothy, was then serving St. John's Church on West Lombard street in Baltimore, and the then 10-year-old boy and his

mother made their home with him.

Following in the footsteps of his father and all of his brothers, one of whom was buried on the Gold Coast of Africa, he chose the ministry as his lifework.

He was graduated from Elmhurst College, Elmhurst, Ill., as well as from Eden Theological Seminary in St. Louis. He was

ordained into the Ministry July 21, 1912, Ohio, with three of officiating.
