SPECIAL MESSAGE FROM THE GENERAL SYNOD

To our sisters and brothers in Christ in the congregations of the United Church of Christ.

We, the delegates to the Tenth General Synod of the United Church of Christ, send you our greetings, our thanks for your support of the church's work, and this message.

When Jesus visited his home synagocgue in Nazareth, he read from the words of Isaiah:

"The spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for he has anointed me. He has sent me to bring good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the down-trodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favor!" (Isaiah 61: 1-2)

These familiar words also identify the mission to which we are called as individuals, as local churches, and as the United Church.

SPECIAL MESSAGE FROM THE GENERAL SYNOD (Contd.)

Jesus Christ frees and unites us to live out the Gospel in word and in deed so that young and old may understand and respond to God's love. Jesus Christ frees and unites us to see the vast and complex problems which threaten human survival as opportunities to work for the healing of the world's hurts and divisions - for the lifting up of every human being to freedom and justice and wholeness.

This magnificent mission has been weakened by decreasing income.

We, the delegates to the Tenth General Synod of the United Church of Christ, have adopted a PROPOSAL ON STEWARDS IN SUPPORT OF MISSION which seeks to engage the members, congregations, associations, conferences, and national agencies of the United Church of Christ in working together to develop and carry out plans to increase financial support for the local church and for the wider mission. We have also committed ourselves to promote, interpret, and implement this stewardship proposal.

In due time your conference will be contacting your congregation to enlist your participation in the plans that will be developed. In the meantime we invite you to join us in doing two things. First, re-examine your financial support for the church's work in light of your income and resources, your financial responsibilities, and especially in light of your Christian faith. Second, consider carefully whether as part of your Christian commitment you can give to your church as least \$1.00 per week for every \$1,000.00 of annual income.

SPECIAL MESSAGE FROM THE GENERAL SYNOD (Contd.)

We want to respond to the opportunities for ministry which God gives us, and we believe that you do, too. We invite you to join us in asking God to grant to all of us power to be more effective agents of accomplishing our mission in the world.

HALLOWEEN

Did you ever think of Halloween as a holy day? Does Halloween belong in the Christian calendar? Halloween is a contract for Hallow Eve. This holy evening occurs the day before All Saints' Day, November 1. There is a connection.

Halloween has come to mean spooks and goblins. What's behind that spooky ghost meaning? We think of ghosts as some kind of reappearance of the dead. Witches and their brews called forth the spirits of the dead.

In Christianity Halloween is preparation for All Saints' Day. All Saints' Day is called in Britain All Hallows' Day. So the day before is called Halloween - Hallow Even.

All Hallows' Day or All Saints' Day is the feast of the saints known and unknown. We especially remember all of the Christians who have died.

We can see how spooks came to be associated with Halloween.

Since World War II Christians around the world have celebrated Holy Communion on the 1st Sunday in October.

The celebration of Holy Communion varies in Christianity. The Eucharist is celebrated at every Mass. In some Protestant denominations Holy Communion is celebrated at least once each Sunday. Some denominations celebrate only several times each year. Others celebrate Holy Communion monthly.

WORLD WIDE COMMUNION SUNDAY (Contd.)

When communion is celebrated you are encouraged to receive it. But you can be present at worship and need not receive Holy Communion each time it is celebrated.

Do not take Holy Communion more than once a day.

WALK FOR HUNGER



CONTACT - BALTIMORE 332-1114

On Sunday, June 1st, CONTACT-BALTIMORE began operation for the metropolitan area of Baltimore City and the surrounding counties. This is the 67th in a national network of centers known as CONTACT Teleministries. Trained volunteers are answering the CONTACT-BALTIMORE telephone number 332-1114 on an around-the-clock basis. While including the finest resources for crisis intervention and referral, the CONTACT Center ministers to anyone who has a problem and needs a "listener".

CONFIRMATION I AND II ANNOUNCEMENTS

NEIGHBORS IN NEED OFFERING - OCTOBER 5

Neighbors in Need - an every church fall offering for the support of special projects administered by the National Church and related to the crisis of poverty and race. One third of these funds are retained by the Conference, the rest goes to national and international work. Envelopes are included for this offering to be received on October 5. This offering is not included in Basic Support (apportionment).

OCTOBER 15, 1725

After the first German Reformed people settled in Pennsylvania, layman John Phillip Boehm began ministering to groups of them as congregations, serving communion to 40 persons at Falkner Swamp on October 15, 1725 - 250 years ago. A Philadelphia meeting in 1747 organized approximately 50 congregations into a denomination. These Reformed people, more and more touched by the political unrest, felt bound by conscience to fulfill obligations to the movement for Independence. As part of your bicentennial celebration visit Falkner Swamp Church located near Boyertown, Pennsylvania. There will be a celebration on Wednesday, October 15, 1975, to mark the 250 anniversary of the Communion celebration and our participation in the Bicentennial.
