



PASTOR'S COLUMN

On Sunday, June 6, 1976, we will celebrate the Festival of Pentecost. That is the special day in the Church Year, when we say "Happy Birthday" to and within the whole Church of Jesus Christ. We remember with special attention and commemoration the event recorded in Acts 2:1-42. And we are most especially grateful for God's gift of Himself to us as the Holy Spirit.

This year at United Evangelical we are making that day very special. Not only will we celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Communion at the 7:45 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services, but we will also welcome new members into our fellowship as well. The Rite of Confirmation will be administered to members of the Second Year Confirmation Class and new Adult Members will be received at the 10:30 a.m. Festival Service.

Since the congregation voted to retain the Chancel method of serving the Holy Communion, the Church Council and I are instituting an experimental procedure to help more of our members receive this Sacrament. The first pew on both sides of the center aisle will be reserved for those individuals who prefer to receive the bread and the cup in the pew or who are unable to climb the three steps into the Chancel area. When all others have been served, this Pastor and his Assistant will bring the elements and serve the Holy Communion to those seated in that first pew. Therefore, those having difficulty with step can enter the church at the Tower Door and

PASTOR'S COLUMN (Continued)

With a minimum of effort be seated in the first pew where they can remain seated until the Holy Communion is served to them. We hope that as a result of utilizing this method, more of our members will be able to receive the Holy Communion in the Church at least 2 or 3 times per year.

Another idea being considered, but not yet decided upon, would be to hold a special Sunday afternoon Communion Service specially designed with our older and handicapped members in mind. With the special help of family, neighbors, friends, and Council Members, our normally shut-in members and those able to get out to see the doctor in good weather can be encouraged to come to the Church to receive Holy Communion during this shortened special service. If this seems to you an idea which would make it possible for you to receive the Holy Communion in the church when it is otherwise not possible for you to do so, please inform us at the Church Office (276-0393) and we will include your name on the list for such special consideration.

Let us all celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit into our midst and into each of our lives.

WHERE OUR MONEY GOES

Authorization to expend \$114,500 of ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING funds for projects overseas was voted by the UC Board for World Ministries at its March meeting.

Marathi Mission, Vadala, India, will receive \$7,500 to operate an extension service. The work of Pauline King at Katpadi, India, will receive \$10,000 to purchase land adjacent to that occupied by the Family Children's Center.

In the Philippines, \$10,000 will be spent to help resettled slum families set up backyard swine and poultry projects. Much of the money will be used in loans.

Kojedo Community Health and Development Project in Korea will receive \$5,000.

Turkey's Development Foundation has been granted \$15,000 to help purchase and breed animals, some of which will come from the Juniata Association of Penn West Conference.

Palestinian refugees will continue to receive aid in Syria with a \$10,000 grant. Some of this money will be used to set up poultry raising projects.

Two grants have been made to Togo, Africa. One, for \$8,000, will buy a vehicle to transport well drilling equipment. An additional \$20,000 has been granted to purchase tractors.

The national YWCA of Liberia, which received 1,300 acres from the government there,

wishes to set up development programs on the land. A grant of \$10,000 was made for this purpose.

Additional smaller grants were made: \$5,000 to Family and Childrens' Service, Ethiopia; \$2,000 to help feed 124 children in northern Kenya, and \$2,000 to build a community center for poorly nourished people at Salatiga, Indonesia to help raise living standards.

RECENT UPDATE ON WORLD HUNGER

The World Hunger crisis has spawned a new Theological Studies work group. Various denominations are organizing study groups locally to deal with various sub-issues. But most significant is that the church-at-large expects to spend tens of millions of dollars on hunger programs. And now some real value questions arise for how that money is to be spent wisely according to Christian ethical decision-making. These questions are worth considering:

---Should our dollars go for immediate relief of alive and starving people or for agricultural development so that future generations can better feed themselves?

---Should the U.S. aid nations whose population is growing at a rate to outstrip all world resources or should we stand back and allow a 'natural remedy' to occur - the thinning out of the 'overage of people'?

---Should our values be informed by the notion that over population causes poverty and starvation or that poverty and starvation cause overpopulation as some recent studies would indicate?

---Do we focus on the hunger next door or across the world?

---Do we seek to lower population growth overseas or over-consumption at home (to do both would be to come out against both motherhood and apple pie!)?

These are some of the questions being addressed by professional theologians, social ethicists, lay leaders, professionals in food production and distribution, by third world people and by others in this theological studies project. And I thought you should have the opportunity to struggle with these questions also!

1. Stand by us, not over us. Give us the feeling that we are not alone in the world, that we can always count on you when we are in trouble.
2. Make us feel that we are loved and wanted. We want to love you, not as a duty but because you love us.
3. Train us by being affectionately firm. You will achieve more with us through patient teaching than by punishment or preaching. Say "no" when you feel you have to; but explain your rules. Don't merely impose them.
4. Bring us up so that we will not always need you. Teach us how to take on responsibility and become independent of you. We will learn this faster and better if you will let us question you, your ideas and standards.
5. Don't act shocked when we do things we shouldn't. It is going to take us time to learn how to grow into life properly.
6. Try to be as consistent as possible. If you are mixed up about what you want from us, why shouldn't we be mixed up too in what we give you?
7. Don't try to make us feel inferior. We doubt ourselves enough without you confirming it. Predicting failure for us won't help us succeed.

2. A Planting experience. Youth from some of the Churches have planted an acre of corn, tomatoes and potatoes near Cambridge, Md. Other youth and youth groups are needed to weed at the end of May and during June. Groups are also needed to pick starting July 15. We will be taking orders for produce from all church members. Proceeds go to World Hunger. For further information see Mrs. Hengen.
3. Trip to Puerto Rico. The money from the dinner and show given by our Youth Group will go to help support this trip. If you can give a personal donation also, it would be appreciated. About \$3,500. of the \$6,000. needed has been received. Gary Pate will be going from United Evangelical.
4. Future plans to support a missionary for 3 years is being discussed.

AN EXPERIMENTAL PROCEDURE

Beginning on Pentecost Sunday, June 6, 1976, we will begin an experimental procedure which should be helpful to the entire congregation.

(c. 1. 1. 1.)

Since it was the decision of the congregation at the Special Congregational Meeting held on April 25, to retain Chancel Communion, the Pastor and the Church Council have agreed to designate and reserve the first pew in the front of the Church on both sides of the center aisle for those individuals who desire to receive the Holy Communion in the pews. This will apply to those individuals who are unable to come to the Chancel Rail and for those who prefer to remain in the pews for this purpose.

The procedure will happen as follows:

Following the last group to receive the Holy Communion at the Chancel Rail when every one else has been served, the Pastor and assisting lay person or clergy, will bring the elements of the Communion to those individuals who are seated in the first pew.

If for some special reason the individual is unable or unwilling to sit in the first pew and still desires to receive the Holy Communion, special arrangements can be made with the Pastor to receive private Holy Communion in their home.

It is our desire to make sure that as many members of the congregation as possible receive the Holy Communion at least 2 or 3 times per year. We hope this new experimental procedure will help in our seeking to accomplish this objective.

On Thursday evening, June 10 at 7:30 p.m. in the Church Hall of Zion Evangelical Lutheran United Church of Christ, Golden Ring Road near Race Road, the Rev. Ms. Joyce Myers, returned United Church of Christ Missionary, is scheduled to speak and share her experiences. Ms. Myers has been a missionary in Angola for 12 years and has served as a teacher for the past 6 years at the Emmanuel Seminary in the central highlands mission of Dondí. When serious fighting broke out among the 3 liberation groups she was one of the last American missionaries to leave Angola. The Church Council of Central Angola, under which she worked, recommended that all foreign personnel leave for the duration of the fighting but Ms. Myers has vowed to return "as soon after independence as possible."

This is an excellent opportunity for us to learn first-hand what the life of a UCC foreign missionary is like, especially in a country so much in the news these days. It is also a chance for us to get a personalized report of how some of Our Christian World Mission (O.C.W.M.) dollars are being spent.
