"Getting down to brass tacks" may mean different things to different people. But I suspect for the purposes of this issue of the United Endeavor that means "tacking down" some important matters of interest and concern as we move forward together into the Fall and Winter seasons of the Church Year. World Communion Sunday, Thanksgiving and Advent will be here before we are ready unless significant plans are made now. Those plans will have even more meaning for our life together as a congregation if we develop longer-term goals and objectives.

It is to that latter task that these thoughts of mine are now pointed. A congregation-wide (every member) planning process has already begun. In one sense that process had begun before I became your new Pastor last January, 1976. The Pulpit Search Committee was involved in setting some tentative goals as candidates were interviewed and recommendations made. New goals and objectives for our future together are now being formulated as various leaders work with me in that planning process. And every member's hopes and wishes for our future together are important. "Getting down to brass tacks" will probably mean for us to develop the most effective method to include everyone's hopes, wishes, goals and objectives in an overall Plan or series of Goals for at least the next 5 years.

On August 1, 1976, in my sermon I proposed the study and use of The Letter to the Ephesians in the New Testament during the

## THE CANTON HAPPENING - 1976

The Canton Happening, the daily vacation Church School, was held from July 6th to July 23rd. It was sponsored again by the following Churches: Canton United Methodist, Episcopal Chapel of the Holy Evangelist, Messiah Lutheran, Wesley United Methodist, St. Brigid's Catholic Church and our own United Evangelical. Sessions were held from 9:00 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. at St. Brigid's and United Evangelical. The lessons and story materials were taught at United, craft and art work at St. Brigid's. Each morning an opening program was held at United from 9:00 to 9:30 a.m. after which the group divided to go into classes at each Church. A nursery and kindergarten class was held at United also.

The theme this year was "God's Love Is Jesus". Lessons and art and craft work were based on this theme.
