Our aim is to quicken the conscience of our membership, that all may be fulfilling their obligation to "gather in the courts of the Lord" regularly.

The average attendance at our services needs to be increased in good measure. Of a congregation of some thing under 1000 members, we ought

to strive for an average attendance of from 600-700 on an average winter Sunday. It is possible to achieve this mark, if our members ful fil their obligations to the Lord, chief of which is to be in Church in a most regular manner for these services of praise and worship

The pastor is not joshing when he says, "See you in church Sunday"for being in church is an important mat ter for all folk. Do something on this matter this coming Sunday.

DID YOU KNOW

...the Pastor has established his study at the church, and maintains definite hours there each morning, Tuesday through Friday, from 9 a. to noon.
