



THE REVELATION AND ADVENT

The Revelation of St. John, the last book of the New Testament, about which we have been concerned in our Sunday meditations since the month of September and which concern we will resume after the holidays, this book of prophecy and revelation concerning God and Christ's plans, teaches the basic Christian dogma of the pre-existence of Jesus at the right and of Almighty God even as it teaches the presence of the glorified Christ at God's right hand in eternity.

As we enter another period of Ad vent, the pre-Christmas season, we note that the church teaches a dual interpretation of this first season of the Christian Church Year, which runs from the beginning of Advent thru to the beginning of another Ad vent. The first interpretation is to herald again the coming of the Lord as our Saviour, born at Bethlehem that first Christmas. Thus we rejoice in all the aspects of the Bethlehem story and embellish our Christian retelling with the meaningful practices of Christmas festivities at church and at home. These are all meaningful to us and should be enjoyed again in the knowledge we welcome the Lord Christ into our midst at Christmas.

ASSOCIATE PASTOR TO BE SOUGHT

At the special congregational meeting on Sun. Oct. 29, the congregation voted unanimously to authorize the Church Council to seek an Associate Pastor for the church, a second full-time minister. The Council has begun work to fulfill this charge, communications have been addressed to our Central Atlantic Conference as well as Eden and Lancaster Seminary to help secure the proper man for our needs.

Incidentally, this action will re quire a greatly enlarged budget for 1973 and thereafter. On Nov. 12th the Finance Committee presented the proposed budget(to be acted upon at the Congregational meeting) and revealed that it has been increased by some \$12 to \$13 thousand dollars This means that each of us need to consider an increase in our giving.

SEMINARY OFFERING IN DECEMBER

As you may well know, the financial picture of many of our Protestant denominations is becoming increasingly critical. Our own national church, the United Church of Christ, has come upon grave financial lacks in the proper continuation of its multy-faceted work. The reason for this is that local churches, our own included, have not sent in sufficient benevolent funds to keep the world-wide programs going. Recently your pastor attended the meeting of the Board for World Ministries of the UCC, which Board of some 225 members have the responsibility of carrying on all the work of our church outside the limits of the U.S. For the third or fourth consecutive year this Board has had to curtail the program of proclaiming God's Word to peoples of the world - Africa, India, South America, Micronesia, etc., because we don't have the money. Missionaries have been called home. Where several years ago we had some 500 missionaries, we now have been 200 and 300. So goes the story.

Another place in which curtailment of funds has become apparent is in the decision not to support our Seminaries from funds of the national church. Our Seminaries are the schools wherein men are trained to become clergy. Now the Seminaries

have to look at the local churches directly for support. Thus your Council has decided to have two offerings in the next months one yet in '72 and another in '73, for the support of scholarships for young men who may want to enter our Eden or Lancaster Seminary and do not have sufficient funds.

Thus on Sunday, Dec. 17 you will find envelopes in your bulletins in which we invite you to place a special offering for this cause. Education is expensive, education for the ministry is expensive, thus make your offering as generous as you possibly can. Maybe the day will come when a Pastor of this church will be one you've helped in this special way.
