ADVENT AGAIN

Before there can be a Christmas again there must be an Advent, just as before a family can sit down to a meal at the dining table that meal must be prepared.

We prepare for Christmas in a hysical way for weeks prior to he great day. Christmas lists are drawn up: Christmas cards are received: plans for the family on Christmas Eve begin to jell as do the plans for the festive days of Christmas week. Though it may be hectic for some whose plans for Christmas do not begin soon enough still for the majority of individuals and families all is in readiness when Christmas Eve and the day of Christmas arrive.

Even as much and perhaps moreso should we prepare for Christmas in a spiritual manner. And this is what Advent is, a period of four weeks during which the church bids us make spiritual preparation and provides the wherewithal: ie. ceremonies, Scriptual homilies, carols and Anthems, by which this preparation can be fruitful and advanced.

This preparation is programmed to bring us from afar off in our spiritual thought up to the glory of Christmas in a gradual yet a meaningful manner. Beginning with the 1st Sunday in Advent and the "hanging of the Christmas greens" up to the bringing in of the Christ-child figure to place in the creche crib on Christmas Eve, the journey through Advent to the day of Christmas serves well the need of each of us to prepare ourselves to welcome the Christ-child

Thus, we invite you to make use of the Advent season for spiritual preparation for Christmas even as you make use of the preceeding wake of physical preparation.



CHURCH SCHOOL CHRISTMAS 9 A.M. SUNDAY DEC. 22

The class members and staff of our Church School gather at 9 A.M. in the sanctuary for the annual Christmas Service (do not go to departments first). This service will last ½ hour and following it the departments will meet for an individual Christmas celebration of their own.

Display of our poinsettia altar with many plants.



Following the meal the decoration of the departments of the Church School occurs and the decoration of the sanctuary tree. The afternoon is ended with a carol sing in the sanctuary and a birthday party for the child Jesus in Friendship Hall.
